Aims and Objectives	<p>The course covers the scientific treatment of concepts related to public order and the rule of law. The course consists of: Understanding the basic notions of public order and the rule of law; the national legal system; the international legal system; the UN system for the protection of human rights; the European system of human rights with a focus on the European Convention on Human Rights and its protocols; the system of the Republic of Kosovo for human rights and fundamental freedoms; law enforcement institutions in Kosovo. Government of Kosovo: Police as an institution for maintaining public order and peace; Ministry of Defense: Democratic control of military and police institutions; The judicial system and the principle of separation of powers; Judicial Council of the Republic of Kosovo. Regular Courts in Kosovo; Prosecutorial Council of the Republic of Kosovo. Prosecution system in Kosovo; Constitutional Court of the Republic of Kosovo. Additionally, with special emphasis, the legislation of the Republic of Kosovo will be addressed, characterized by both contravention and penal aspects that encompass the field of public order. In this context, concrete examples will be elaborated upon, highlighting forensic measures for the detection, clarification, and proof of criminal actions related to the disruption of public order..</p> <p>The rule of law is a hallmark of liberal political order and an example of what Max Weber called the increasing rationalization of social life in modernity. In general, liberal western citizens have considered anything other than the rule of law as backward, inefficient, and unfair. It is still often said that there are exceptions to every rule, and from that rule, the rule of law is no exception.</p> <p>Rule of law or the rule of law affects different policy areas and in itself includes political, constitutional, legal, and human rights issues. Any democratic society that aims to promote and promote human rights must recognize the supremacy of law as a fundamental principle. Therefore, the aim of this course is for students to get to know and understand public order and the rule of law in a society within the state but also in international relations.</p> <p>Course objectives:</p>
